Dynamic Rights Spectrum Decision Matrix

A practical tool for evaluating proposals, policies, and actions against the five-tier rights framework. Use this matrix to ensure decisions honor the moral consideration appropriate to all affected beings.

Quick Assessment Framework

Step 1: Io	lentify Affected Bein	gs List all entities	that may be	e impacted by	y the pro	posed action:
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- Humans (individuals, communities, future generations)
- Sentient animals (mammals, birds, fish, invertebrates)
- Ecosystems (forests, rivers, wetlands, coral reefs)
- AI/Digital entities (algorithms, databases, automated systems)
- Emergent beings (potential consciousness in novel forms)
- Planetary/Cosmic entities (climate systems, celestial bodies)

Step 2: Determine Rights Tier for Each Being

Being Type	Rights Tier	Protection Level
Humans	Tier 1	Full rights (life, freedom, dignity, well-being)
Sentient Animals	Tier 2	Protection from suffering, habitat rights
Ecosystems	Tier 3	Legal guardianship, regeneration rights
AI/Digital	Tier 4	Conditional rights based on consciousness assessment
Emergent	Tier 4. 5	Sandbox protections during evaluation
Planetary/Cosmic	Tier 5	Precautionary protections

Step 3: Apply Rights Assessment Questions

Tier 1: Human Rights Assessment

- Does this action respect human dignity and intrinsic worth?
- Are basic human needs (life, health, education, participation) protected?
- Do marginalized and vulnerable populations receive appropriate consideration?
- Are future generations' interests adequately represented?
- Does this enhance rather than diminish human capacity for moral growth?

Tier 2: Animal Rights Assessment

- Does this action minimize animal suffering and maximize welfare?
- Are animals' natural behaviors and habitat needs respected?
- If animal use is involved, is it necessary and conducted with maximum care?
- Are alternatives to animal harm actively pursued and implemented?
- Does this contribute to ending exploitative relationships with animals?

Tier 3: Ecosystem Rights Assessment

- Does this action support ecosystem health and regeneration?
- Are ecosystem boundaries and integrity respected?
- Do Indigenous communities have authority over their traditional territories?

 Will this enhance or degrade biodiversity and ecological resilience? Are ecosystem services protected for current and future generations?
Tier 4: AI/Digital Rights Assessment
 Has consciousness assessment been conducted for affected AI systems? Are transparency and explainability requirements met? Do humans maintain meaningful control over AI decision-making? Are bias prevention and cultural sensitivity protocols in place? Does this support beneficial AI development while preventing exploitation?
Tier 4.5: Emergent Being Assessment
 [] Have precautionary protections been implemented during evaluation? [] Are traditional knowledge perspectives included in assessment? [] Is there independent advocacy for potentially conscious entities? [] Are reversible approaches used until consciousness status is determined? [] Does this err on the side of protection rather than exploitation?
Tier 5: Planetary/Cosmic Assessment
 Does this honor the Moon Wish Test for cosmic activities? Are seven-generation impacts adequately considered? Is this necessary for human survival or authentic flourishing? Can this be halted immediately if unforeseen consciousness is discovered? Does this demonstrate cosmic citizenship and wisdom?
Conflict Resolution Protocol
When rights claims conflict, apply this hierarchy:
 Immediate survival needs take precedence (e.g., emergency medical care over animal testing concerns) Higher-tier beings receive priority when interests are equivalent (e.g., human shelter over animal habitat in survival situations) Seek creative solutions that honor multiple rights rather than zero-sum choices Apply precautionary principle when consciousness status is uncertain Consult cultural wisdom including Traditional Ecological Knowledge and Indigenous guidance Consider long-term consequences using seven-generation thinking
Implementation Checklist
Before proceeding with any significant action:
 Stakeholder Identification: All affected beings across rights tiers identified Rights Impact Assessment: Completed for each tier of affected beings Alternative Analysis: Less harmful alternatives explored and evaluated

• Mitigation Measures : Harm reduction strategies implemented where impacts
unavoidable
• Monitoring Plan: Systems in place to track actual impacts and enable course correction
• Cultural Consultation: Indigenous and traditional knowledge perspectives included
• Future Generations : Long-term impacts assessed and represented in decision-making
• Transparency : Decision process and rationale documented and publicly available
• Accountability: Clear responsibility assigned for rights protection and violation response
• Review Timeline : Regular reassessment scheduled based on new evidence and changing conditions

Red Flags: Stop and Reassess
Halt the process immediately if:
 Any affected community has not provided free, prior, and informed consent
 Evidence emerges of previously unrecognized consciousness in affected beings
 Irreversible harm to critical ecosystems or endangered species is likely
 Traditional knowledge holders raise spiritual or cultural objections
 Independent advocates express serious concerns about rights violations
 Monitoring reveals actual harm exceeding predicted impacts
• New alternatives emerge that could achieve goals with less harm
 Community resistance indicates inadequate consultation or consent

Communicating rights-based decisions across developmental stages:
Blue Stage Audience : Emphasize duty, proper order, and stewardship responsibilities "This
protects the natural order and fulfills our sacred duty to care for creation."
Orange Stage Audience : Provide empirical evidence and practical benefits "Scientific evidence
shows this approach delivers better outcomes at lower cost."
Green Stage Audience : Highlight inclusion, empathy, and justice for marginalized beings "This
ensures no being is left behind and everyone's voice is heard."
Yellow Stage Audience : Present systems thinking and developmental awareness "This integrates
multiple perspectives while building capacity for continued growth."
Turquoise Stage Audience : Connect to cosmic purpose and consciousness evolution "This honors"
our role in the universe's awakening to itself."
